At pre-registration, the exhibitor:

- Will purchase a 2026 Brampton Fair Membership (Exhibitor's card) for \$10.00.
- Junior sections (aged 18 years and under) are FREE – Unless entering outside of the Junior sections.
- Adult sections (aged 19 - 64 years) – Exhibitor fee required.
- Senior sections (aged 65 and older) – Exhibitor fee required.
- Groups (Schools, Day cares, and Senior's facilities) will be issued one (1) Exhibitor number – Exhibitor fee required – Allowance of one (1) item entry per class.
- Will submit a completed entry form; by going to <https://www.assistexpo.ca/brampton-fall-fair> OR a traditional entry form available at homecraft@peelagsociety.com or at the office.
- Will pick up one (1) entry tags per item being entered for Fall Fair judging. You can fill these out at home.
- Will not bring their items to the Fair, just yet...

The Fair Will:

- Provide one (1) single-day admission pass given to each Homecraft exhibitor pre-registering. Note: Groups (incl. Schools, Daycares, and Senior's Facilities) will receive just one (1) admission pass.
- Exhibitors not pre-registering on or before Saturday September 12th , 2026 will not be eligible for a one-day pass to the 2026 Fall Fair. No exceptions.

Homecraft entries will not be accepted after 11:15am on Thursday.

Homecraft Division Rules & Regulations

- All entries must be the work of the exhibitor (homegrown, non-professional), except within the Antique Section where the exhibitor is the owner.
- New Exhibitors must note on the back of the entry tag – “New Exhibitor to this Section”. Senior Citizens should also indicate “Senior Citizen” on back of entry tag.
- Exhibitors will be allowed one entry per class. If there are seven (7) or more entries in a class in an Adult Section, a fourth prize may be awarded at the judge’s discretion. There will be no ties. Judges are instructed not to award prizes when only one exhibit is in a class, unless it is deemed worthy.
- All exhibitors – in order to receive awards – must leave a completed entry form listing all of their items with the Homecraft Representative in charge at day of registration.
- Allow yourself enough time to get your exhibits registered, tagged and delivered to their sections before cutoff. Please ensure to print exhibitor’s number, name and city on each entry tag.
- Exhibits having been previously awarded a prize at Brampton Fall Fair will not be considered for judging.
- **The Exhibit Halls will close at 5:00pm on Sunday, September 20th, 2026. Exhibits to be removed between 5:30pm and 6:00pm. THIS RULE WILL BE STRICTLY ENFORCED. Exhibitor’s card must be shown to claim exhibits. Brampton Fall Fair is not responsible for any items left after 6:00pm on Sunday - however, committees will attempt to collect remaining items and place them in storage temporarily.**
- The Peel Agricultural Society, operating the Brampton Fall Fair, is not responsible for damages or losses of goods.
- **Ten dollars (\$10.00) will be deducted from all prize monies that are valued at twenty dollars (\$20.00) or more for a 2027 Exhibitor’s card.**
- Specials and/or prizes are subject to change without notice, but will be replaced with something of equal value. Gift certificates may be issued in lieu of prize money. Should more special prize money, certificates, or gifts become available they will be awarded at the Fair.
- **ERRORS:** The Peel Agricultural Society will not hold itself responsible for any printer’s errors or other palpable errors in this prize list.
- No ticket, medal or other award of any former exhibition or name of exhibitor, or any mark by which the owner of the exhibit can be known will be allowed on the articles until the judges have completed their awards.

- Ontario Judging and Exhibiting Standards for Horticulture and Floral Design will be the accepted guide for judging. <http://www.gardenontario.org/abo/judging.php>
- Chief points of design: colour, harmony, distinction, condition of blooms and relation to container.
- Cut flowers – flowers with foliage should be chosen.
- A stem may have one or more branches.
